### **Romans 1:8-15 (NLT)**

**8** Let me say first that I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith in him is being talked about all over the world. **9** God knows how often I pray for you. Day and night I bring you and your needs in prayer to God, whom I serve with all my heart by spreading the Good News about his Son. **10** One of the things I always pray for is the opportunity, God willing, to come at last to see you. **11** For I long to visit you so I can bring you some spiritual gift that will help you grow strong in the Lord. **12** When we get together, I want to encourage you in your faith, but I also want to be encouraged by yours. **13** I want you to know, dear brothers and sisters, that I planned many times to visit you, but I was prevented until now. I want to work among you and see spiritual fruit, just as I have seen among other Gentiles. **14** For I have a great sense of obligation to people in both the civilised world and the rest of the world, to the educated and uneducated alike. **15** So I am eager to come to you in Rome, too, to preach the Good News.

**What does Paul pray for the Roman church (vv 9-10)?**

**Why does Paul want to visit the church in Rome (vv 11-13, 15)?**

**Paul uses the word “obligation” in verse 14. Obligation means a sense of duty or keeping a promise. Paul wants to keep his promise to God to share the Good News about Jesus. Promises can be hard to keep sometimes. Why? What promises are difficult to keep? Which ones are easy?**
